Key to Walks Grading System Terrain Terrain

S = short – under 5km M = medium – 5-10km

L = long - over 10km

Distance

1-3 = Graded or open terrain, no scrub 4-7 = Bush, minor scrub, rainforest, Rocks, creeks, rockhopping, scrambling 8-10 = Bush as above + thick scrub, major

8-10 = Bush as above + thick scrub, major rock Scrambling using hands, technical 1-3 = Easy, suitable for beginners

4-7 = Medium, reasonable fitness required

8-10 = Hard, strenuous, fit walkers only

Journey: 160km \$16 Map Ref: Mirani Grade: L15

Estimated walking time: 6 hours **Total of all all uphill sections**: 100m **Pace**: average **Terrain**: graded walking track **Vegetation**: rainforest

Expect: leeches, snakes, swimming

This is a return walk commencing at Eungella township along the graded walking track to Broken River. The track takes us past several lookouts eventually crossing Broken River where we should be able to enjoy lunch and a swim. Some walkers may wish to end their walk at Broken River while we return to Eungella. The walk is suitable for beginners and is entirely on graded walking track. You will need to bring plenty of water, swimmer and insect repellent.

Estimated walking time: 5-6 hours Total of all uphill sections: 250m Pace: average Terrain: very uneven Vegetation: rain forest some wait-a-while Expect: mostly rockhopping, scrambles, swimming holes.

Owens Creek is about 14km northwest of Garget. It is a most interesting creek meandering through rain forest

Although this is a reasonably easy walk, it is only suitable for walkers who are confident rock hoppers. We are sure to encounter some wait-a-while, so come prepared.

If numbers permit, we may split into two groups, a

fast group and a slow group.

Upper Cattle Creek Sunday March 18th

Difficulty: Moderate to Difficult

Grade: M88 (some may think M11 11)

Estimated walking time: 6.5 hours **Total of all uphill sections** 240m **Pace:** slow **Terrain:** very uneven, **Vegetation:** rain forest **Expect:** some rock hopping, scrambling up and down steep slopes, vines, fallen trees swimming holes.

This will be a fairly difficult walk down a steep creek till we reach Cattle Creek. (About 4 kms down stream from Lineel Falls). We will walk down stream a ways, find some swimming holes and return via what I think is Rescue Ridge. There will be a steep climb out of the creek and onto a ridge where it will be easier going. This walk is for experienced walkers only. You will need to carry water and food for the whole day.

A change of clothes to travel home is a must.

Cape Hillsborough Creek 4, Black Wasp Overhang and Paradox Falls

25 March 2018

Depart: 07:00 Journey: 100km Grade: M65 Total Uphill: 460m

Terrain: Rock hopping, scrambling.

This is a new look at Cape Hillsborough area. We go up a creek with small gorges in parts and investigate some cave overhangs then up to the top of lookout peak for 360 deg views. Back down another creek for a short distance, uphill to a large overhang cave then a scramble to the top of this for more views. From here a stroll cross-country to the top of Paradox Falls. (usually not flowing) If time permits we will investigate the bottom of this fall. This walk would be suited to beginner walkers as well as others but it is a reasonably full day walk of 8 or 9km with 460m height gain and loss.

The arrangements for this camp are yet to be finalised but the plan is to drive to Moonlight Dam on Good Friday morning. We will then backpack up to Denham Range to camp. This is about a distance of 16kms and it is all on track. The first 11 kms are relatively flat but the next 5 are very steep and this makes it quite a challenging walk.

We will camp at the Denham Range campground for 2 nights and on the Saturday undertake a day walk to the Stalk. Other club members who would prefer not to backpack are welcome to drive to Denham Range to camp with us and to participate in the Saturday walk.

Sunday we will backpack back to Moonlight Dam with spectacular views along the way and camp the night there. Monday morning we can do a short walk in Moonlight Creek before returning home.

Lineel Falls and Pretty Creek Sunday11th February
