Key to Walks Grading System Terrain Terrain

Distance

S = short – under 5km M = medium – 5-10km L = long – over 10km 1-3 = Graded or open terrain, no scrub

4-7 = Bush, minor scrub, rainforest, Rocks, creeks, rockhopping, scrambling 8-10 = Bush as above + thick scrub, major rock

Scrambling using hands, technical

1-3 = Easy, suitable for beginners

4-7 = Medium, reasonable fitness required

8-10 = Hard, strenuous, fit walkers only

We will be doing 2 walks in the area N.E of Homevale, which is accessed through Crediton State Forest and camping overnight at the vehicles (4WD)

Note: All members are eligible to attend "Car based camps."

4WDs and dry weather will be necessary for the weekend. National Parks has cleared the road since the cyclone. It has been checked out recently and was in good condition. Numbers may need to be limited due to availability of 4WD vehicles so get in early and book no later than 12 noon Wednesday 6th September.

Estimated walking time: 6 hours, Total of uphill: 450m Vegetation: Open forest - rainforest with rivers. Expect: loose rocks, possible moonlighter

and scratchie lantana.

Not visited for several years, Lost Rock is one of our classic wilderness walks. Nestled in rainforest on the slope of the 1085 peak, "Domani" the rock must surely be over 100metres high. However we are able to access the top and enjoy the sweeping breathtaking views from Mackay to Mt St John. Ghost bats have been observed in a cavern about 6m from the ground at the base of the rock.

Hopefully we can find the rock.

to be found among the rocks. A spot of beach combing showed some interesting finds, plenty of the usual plastic rubbish, driftwood and the like, but also the bleached skeleton of an unfortunate small green turtle.

Distracted by the whales and wonderful scenery we didn't quite make it to the planned lookout point at the cape tip but never-the-less, we were rewarded with a lovely



view and a lunchtime show from the whales at Windmill Bay. None of us got tired of watching the whales, although capturing them in a photo proved to be a

Crediton Scrub 13th August



Sixteen members, including our three Life Members and one recent inductee negotiated a section of the Great Highlands Walk in near perfect weather conditions, setting out from the cars in Up River Road, Crediton at about 9.15 am. The marked trail was in excellent condition with the tapes and orange triangles clearly visible, bearing witness to the fact that it had all been tidied up well after the advent of Cyclone Debbie.

The creek crossings at the start of the walk provided the usual challenges to some participants, but we all managed to negotiate one log or the other, with help from our friends in some cases. Wildlife sightings were few, but the birdsong and the flora made up for it. Many examples of flowering King Orchids were noticed, and some of these were perched very high up in trees, the yellow providing a contrast to the greenery everywhere. Pencil orchids and large brown fungi as well as a more delicate cream variety had the cameras working

overtime.

We spent a lot of time in the middle section of the trail stepping over logs, and the abundant vines provided tripping opportunities. A few walkers collected leeches and ticks, but they were fairly rare. Morning tea was enjoyed in rain forest surroundings, but lunch was eaten on the roadside near the great white tank. The return journey was completed in a shorter time ready for the long car trip home.
